THE ONE BELONGING TO SIMON - Luke 5:3

Jesus walks onto the job site and asks Simon the question he's probably been planning to ask for a while now.

Can I use your boat?

My memory of fisher-folk is that they have zero desire to set someone up for a joyride after working all night. When they are cleaning up, when they haven't caught what they need to catch: this is no time to ask a favor.

Maybe Simon is too tired to say anything at all. Jesus hits him with a one-two request. Can I use your boat? And will you take us out a little further (v.3)?

This is before the beginning of the miracle. In other words, it's not until after Jesus teaches a lesson from Simon's boat – God only knows how long that took – that the familiar part of this story unfolds.

James and John are continuing the cleanup effort, while Jesus is with Simon in Simon's boat, urging him to let down the nets that have just been cleaned. Much is at stake. The others aren't joining the movement unless Simon does.

For all that is said and written about leadership, you don't often hear sustained reflection on the reality made apparent here; namely, if we wait until it feels right to lead, we might miss the boat.

"Jesus did not show up after a good night's sleep and a hearty breakfast. He came...at the end of long working day, after backbreaking labor (Peter Eaton)." He approached Peter, the would-be leader, with a hard ask, and the timing was rough.

As those who belong to a society wherein discomfort is avoided at all costs, this story comes for us with questions. Is our boat Jesus-accessible when we are tired? And who is counting on us to try differently, when we don't feel like it?

"He (Jesus) told them to keep on working. He does the same to the preacher of this passage, and to all of us."

Luke 5:1-11

Once while Jesus was standing beside the lake of Gennesaret, and the crowd was pressing in on him to hear the word of God, 2he saw two boats there at the shore of the lake; the fishermen had gone out of them and were washing their nets. ³He got into one of the boats, the one belonging to Simon, and asked him to put out a little way from the shore. Then he sat down and taught the crowds from the boat. 4When he had finished speaking, he said to Simon, "Put out into the deep water and let down your nets for a catch." 5Simon answered, "Master, we have worked all night long but have caught nothing. Yet if you say so, I will let down the nets." 6When they had done this, they caught so many fish that their nets were beginning to break. 7So they signaled their partners in the other boat to come and help them. And they came and filled both boats, so that they began to sink. ⁸But when Simon Peter saw it, he fell down at Jesus' knees, saying, "Go away from me, Lord, for I am a sinful man!"9For he and all who were with him were amazed at the catch of fish that they had taken; 10and so also were James and John, sons of Zebedee, who were partners with Simon. Then Jesus said to Simon, "Do not be afraid; from now on you will be catching people." 11When they had brought their boats to shore, they left everything and followed him.
