SO HE TOLD THEM THIS PARABLE - Luke 15:3

The endgame for Jesus is not to destroy this contingent of Pharisees and the scribes. The endgame is something altogether different.

You may have heard about the homeless chess champion, a young boy who has taken New York City by storm. He and his family fled Boko Haram and came to this country with nothing, save the hope of survival and a second chance. When I say that this child has learned to play chess, he has learned to play chess.

Tani has guts. At the state tournament, the coaches – all of them – shook their heads when he sacrificed a bishop for a pawn. Someone apparently entered the move into a computer and a second round a head shaking ensued when it was clear that he had done the thing that would, in fact, advance the mission.

This child has great in him. In particular, he has the ability to see several moves beyond where he is, at any given point. Some of it is innate talent. Intellect paired with focus certainly plays a role. At the risk of reading into the story more than what is there, I say that Tani has heart. His heart is in it in such a way that he cannot help but champion more than a personal victory.

Jesus is like that. He sees beyond the moment (even as he is very much in it) and his responses, in the back and forth of first century debate, are appreciative of the long game.

The parable of the parent who had two children is not told in a vacuum. Jesus tells this story to folks who are voicing discontent with his ministry. They don't like how he does table fellowship and they can't see where it is going.

What we miss, when we lose sight of the context, is perhaps as important as whatever we might take away from the plotline. Jesus tells a story that communicates a big-hearted possibility. Rather than you can have your tables and I'll have mine, the parable tells of a table where both of them are desired - a table where the father whom they share transforms the same old squabble.

Jesus cannot help but champion the feast. He came to our flesh with nothing, save the hope of repairing the breach.

Luke 15:1-3, 11b-32

Now all the tax-collectors and sinners were coming near to listen to him. ²And the Pharisees and the scribes were grumbling and saying, 'This fellow welcomes sinners and eats with them.' ³ So he told them this parable:

¹¹ Then Jesus said, 'There was a man who had two sons. ¹²The younger of them said to his father, "Father, give me the share of the property that will belong to me." So he divided his property between them. ¹³A few days later the younger son gathered all he had and travelled to a distant country, and there he squandered his property in dissolute living. ¹⁴When he had spent everything, a severe famine took place throughout that country, and he began to be in need. ¹⁵So he went and hired himself out to one of the citizens of that country, who sent him to his fields to feed the pigs. ¹⁶He would gladly have filled himself with the pods that the pigs were eating; and no one gave him anything. ¹⁷But when he came to himself he said, "How many of my father's hired hands have bread enough and to spare, but here I am dying of hunger! ¹⁸I will get up and go to my father, and I will say to him, 'Father, I have sinned against heaven and before you; ¹⁹I am no longer worthy to be called your son; treat me like one of your hired hands.'"

²⁰So he set off and went to his father. But while he was still far off, his father saw him and was filled with compassion; he ran and put his arms around him and kissed him. ²¹Then the son said to him, "Father, I have sinned against heaven and before you; I am no longer worthy to be called your son." ²²But the father said to his slaves, "Quickly, bring out a robe—the best one—and put it on him; put a ring on his finger and sandals on his feet. ²³And get the fatted calf and kill it, and let us eat and celebrate; ²⁴for this son of mine was dead and is alive again; he was lost and is found!" And they began to celebrate.

²⁵ 'Now his elder son was in the field; and when he came and approached the house, he heard music and dancing. ²⁶He called one of the slaves and asked what was going on. ²⁷He replied, "Your brother has come, and your father has killed the fatted calf, because he has got him back safe and sound." ²⁸Then he became angry and refused to go in. His father came out and began to plead with him. ²⁹But he answered his father, "Listen! For all these years I have been working like a slave for you, and I have never disobeyed your command; yet you have never given me even a young goat so that I might celebrate with my friends. ³⁰But when this son of yours came back, who has devoured your property with prostitutes, you killed the fatted calf for him!" ³¹Then the father said to him, "Son, you are always with me, and all that is mine is yours. ³²But we had to celebrate and rejoice, because this brother of yours was dead and has come to life; he was lost and has been found."
